The District of Columbia's Department on Disability Services (DDS), the Developmental Disabilities Council (DDC) and the Mayor's Office on Latino Affairs (MOLA), in collaboration with Quality Trust, the Office of Disability Rights (ODR), and the District of Columbia's Office of Human Resources (DCHR) hosted the first annual Latino Conference for people with disabilities and their families.

The conference was designed to provide Spanish speaking people with disabilities and their family members with access to information, support, and resources in their native language and assist District agencies to better understand the experiences and needs of Latinos within the disability community.
