Mission

The Developmental Disabilities Council of the District of Columbia seeks to strengthen the voice and presence of people with developmental disabilities and their families in DC to support greater independence, inclusion, empowerment, and the pursuit of life they choose.

We strive to create change that eliminates discrimination and removes barriers to achieve full inclusion, diversity, and equity through our advocacy.



What is the DC Developmental Disabilities Council (DD Council)?

- We are a federally mandated and funded body established by the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act of 2000 - Public Law 106-402 (DD Act).
- The DD Council has 23 members appointed by the Mayor, the majority of whom are people with DD and family members. The remaining members represent government and community organizations that play an important role in services, support, and advocacy for people with disabilities.
- We create a Five-Year State Plan that guides our activities and advocacy efforts, including how to award grant funding.
- The DD Council has full-time staff who are DC government employees.
 These staff support Councilmembers and implement the Five-Year State Plan.
- The DD Council is awarded federal grant funds by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Community Living, and subgrants these funds in accordance with regulations published at 45 CFR Part 75.

What is a developmental disability (DD)?

A disability that is known before the age of 22. In other words, it is a disability that affects some areas of human development.

Some examples of DD include:

- Autism
- Cerebral palsy
- Down Syndrome
- Intellectual Disabilities
- Spina Bifida
- Many others!

Some people with DD never get a formal diagnosis, so when we talk about DD, we include people who do not have a diagnosis but may self-identify as having DD.

Impact: People with developmental disabilities have increased self-determination and led system change to assure equity and inclusion for people with DD and disabilities in society.

Impact: People with developmental disabilities have competitive integrated employment, experience self-sufficiency, and productivity, and contribute to their communities.

The State Plan - Specific Criteria for FYs 2024 and 2025 Goal 3: Community Living



3.2.1 Educational programs for people with DD and their families to have healthy and safe relationships; to recognize abuse, bullying, neglect, sexual or financial exploitation, and violation of legal or human rights; and develop skills to create personal safety plans to live well in their community.

3.2.2 Engage with an underserved cultural and linguistic community to increase knowledge about disability rights, advocacy, and disability and mental health services and support in the community.

3.3.1 Training to develop skills and knowledge in navigating and advocating in the education and disability service system for a successful transition from school to adulthood.

3.3.2 Develop a parent-to-parent support network.

Impact: People with developmental disabilities and their families receive culturally linguistic competence services and support that give them a better quality of life and build inclusive communities.

RFA -Required Information



- 1. Available Funding for Awards: The total amount available for the Grants FYs 2024 and 2025 period is approximately \$125,000. The DDC grant award amount shall not exceed \$50,000. Grant funding will be awarded by March 2024 and last through September 30, 2025.
- 2. Cost Sharing or Match: Applicants must include a 25% match in their proposal, which may be provided as cash, in-kind contributions, volunteer hours, etc.
- 3. Submission Dates and Location: All DDC Grants FYs 2024 and 2025 applications require use and access to the DD Suite-Grant Management System platform. Applications must be received on November 30, 2023, by 11:59 p.m. EST. Applications received after this time will not be accepted. - 4. Eligible Organizations:
 - Public and private entities, nonprofit organizations, education institutions, community-based organizations, faith-based organizations, and fiscally sponsored unincorporated groups.
 - Applicants must be able to provide a Clean Hands Certificate from the Office of Tax and Revenue (OTR) Additional information: https://otr.cfo.dc.gov/page/certificate-clean-hands
 - Grantees must also obtain a Basic Business License from the DC Department of Licensing and Consumer Protection (DLCP). https://dlcp.dc.gov/

Evaluation Criteria - Applications will be rated on a 100-point scale with the following categories and possible points:



- a. Connection to the DD Council mission and goals 20 points
- b. Innovativeness 20 points
- c. Support for Inclusion 20 points
- d. Cultural and Linguistic Competence Elements 10 points
- e. Evaluation Plan Quality 10 points
- f. Budget Plan Quality and Feasibility 10 points
- g. Overall Quality of Application 10 points

- Orientation and Technical Assistance starting November 9, 2023
- Deadline for submission in DD Suite November 30, 2023, at 11:59 pm
- Anticipate Award (s) announced January 31, 2024
- Orientation Part 2 (How to report in DD Suite) and Technical Assistance -February 22, 2024
- Earliest start date March 1, 2024
- Project end date & Closeout (12-18 months following start date) -September 30, 2025
